

Member Spotlight June




We are elated to welcome three new members who joined in June: Annette Mobley, Mary Frances Shellman and Claire Kinsey.

Annette Mobley was born and raised in Atlanta, GA. She moved to Savannah after being stationed here for her Coast Guard duty. She retired from being an Electronic Technician after 20 years of service. After retiring, she filled her time with knitting, crocheting, sewing and quilting. With dreams of being a fashion designer, Annette went to Fashion Design School in New York. When her daughter had her first child, Annette was inspired to make designer diapers. She also started the baby's quilt that remains unfinished and he is 25 years old. She discovered the Colonial Quilt Shop and bought lots of fabric, books and quilting patterns, rulers and notions. This led her to other quilt shops in Georgia and South Carolina with more purchases of fabric and other items. Annette describes her fabric stash as "a lil bit of everything", a wide selection of batiks, flannel, quilting cotton, silk, wool and polyester. "My daughter calls me a hoarder but I'm not. I'm a pack rat. There IS a difference." Annette took many classes at Sew Much More Quilt Shop and learned to master the quarter inch seam. Before that, none of her seams were the same size and she would just sew the blocks together and make them work. During her quilting journey, Annette has made over 100 quilts. Many were given to Project Linus and Quilts of Valor yet others are quilt tops that are stored, waiting for the right moment to quilt them. Annette has a multitude of sewing machines and sergers. Her favorite color is purple and she manages to work the color into almost every quilt. She was so passionate about the color until she dyed her hair purple. Her statement, "Tm gonna sew until I go" should be a T-shirt slogan.

Mary Frances Shellman is originally from Townsend, GA in McIntosh County. She has been retired since 2005 as a middle and high school teacher. Her mother and aunt made quilts for the family. Mary Frances fondly remembers the wooden quilting frame that hung from the ceiling. Although her mother taught her to hand sew as a child, it was limited to patching pants. It was not until 2021 that she made her first quilt for her grandson when she was introduced to the quilting program at Smart Senior. Since then, Mary Frances has completed 3 hand sewn quilts and plans to enter the last one in the Georgia National State Fair 2024. When Mary Frances started purchasing fabric, she bought whatever she liked. She enjoys bright colors, especially, green and yellow. "The fabric is everywhere and my husband has learned to walk around it." Mary Frances has an antique heirloom family quilt given by her sister in law that she cherishes. Her first sewing machine was a treadle machine but she now owns a Janome sewing machine. Mary Frances participated in a group quilt that was auctioned by Smart Senior's with the proceeds going to the local food bank. Her favorite aspect of quilting is seeing the finished product. Her future goal is to continue to improve her quilting process and learn new techniques.

Claire Kinsey was born and raised in Atlanta, GA. She moved to Savannah in 1999 where she works from home as a Real Estate Agent that specializes in Commercial Property Management. Claire was inspired to sew when she had a custom apron made and visited the maker 2 years ago. When she saw the maker's craft room filled with colorful fabric and a pink Janome sewing machine, "my mind nearly exploded". Claire then began purchasing fabric and sewing supplies. She watched many YouTube videos to teach herself to quilt and she made her first quilt using charm packs of 5-inch squares. Not feeling confident enough to finish the quilt, she googled long arm quilting in Savannah. Lanette Edens, the Gypsy Quilter appeared. When she made the consultation visit, Lanette was so impressed with her piecing that a 30-minute visit at 5 PM lasted until 1 AM the next morning. Being encouraged to enter 2 of her quilts into the Georgia National Fair, Claire was excited to win two 3rd Place Ribbons as a first timer. Within 2 years, Claire has made 15 – 20 lap to king size quilts. She gives most of them away and has sold one quilt. The rest of her quilts are on display in her home. Having taken a workshop from Kaffe Fassett and Brandon Mabley on hexagon quilts, her fabric stash is filled with Kaffe Fassett fabrics along with America fabrics and a wide variety of Christmas fabric. Claire had a collection of heirloom family quilts that she gave away because they looked too "country." Ironically, she is now drawn to making traditional looking quilts with that same "country" feel. Her favorite aspect of quilting is the design element. She learning to use the EQ 8 computerized design program. Her future goal is to learn curve piecing and applique. She wants to design her own quilts that are reflective of her creative personality.
