Quilting History

Are you familiar with the story of the *Rajah* quilt and how it is the only documented quilt produced by convict women during their passage to Van Dieman's Land (Tasmania)? When women's prisons became overcrowded in England during the 1840's they were shipped from England to the new penal colonies near Australia. The British Ladies Society for the Reformation of Female Prisoners provided 10 yards of fabric, four balls of white cotton sewing thread, a ball each of black, red and blue thread, some black wool, 24 additional hanks of a variety of colored thread, thimbles, 100 needles, pins and scissors and two pounds of patchwork pieces so the prisoners could be productive on their almost four -month voyage. When you study the quilt, you will see a variety of sewing techniques such as embroidery, patchwork and applique used in the quilt's 2815 pieces. It is currently in Australia's National Gallery of Art. On its border you will find this embroidered sentiment of the seamstress prisoners:

'To the ladies of the convict ship committee, this quilt worked by the convicts of the ship *Rajah* during their voyage to van Dieman's Land is presented as a testimony of the gratitude with which they remember their exertions for their welfare while in England and during their passage and also as a proof that they have not neglected the ladies kind admonitions of being industrious. JUNE 1841

To learn more about the women's crimes and the details of the voyage that produced the *Rajah* quilt, I highly recommend the book *Dangerous Women* by Hope Adams (available at the library, and as an audible book). This quilt's story inspired my community-produced quilt, the Quilt of Many Hands, when I worked for the Amarillo Public Library. My quilters were not prisoners, but they did come together as a group ranging in age from 10 to 99 years old. I feel sure the poor women prisoners never dreamed their quilt would be so influential almost 200 years after its creation.





Our member's hearts have been very busy this month. The delivery to Memorial Hospital included 21 caps, 16 nursing covers and 138 hearts! Fantastic people! We always need cotton colorfast fabric.
